Remember, remember the fifth of November, gunpowder, treason and plot

November is definitely a month for remembering: All Saints Day (1st Nov), the many saints of the Christian Church; All Souls Day (2nd Nov), our own loved ones who have died; Remembrance Day (11th Nov), those who have given their lives to secure and protect our freedom.

The word remember is a strange one: re-member. It literally means to put back together again and so, when we remember, we keep alive an incident or person in our mind.

On 6th November, the Sunday after All Souls Day, we hold a service of remembrance and thanksgiving. Names of loved ones are read out in a special prayer and there is the opportunity to light a candle in their memory. Anyone is welcome to join us for that special service.

On Remembrance Sunday (13th Nov) we re-member, with a two-minute silence, a roll-call of names, the wearing of poppies and the laying of wreaths, the Armistice agreement that ended the 1st World war.

We may not always **want** to remember because, sometimes, remembering is painful; it brings back our loss. Sometimes the act of remembering will feel like a great wave overwhelming us and seeming to knocking us off our feet. But, at other times, the act of remembering is our greatest comfort and strength.

Every Sunday in church we re-member another event too. At the last supper Jesus took the bread and the wine and he said, "do this in remembrance of me." And so we do – every service of Holy Communion is an opportunity to re-member Jesus and his sacrifice.

In the Bible we read how God spoke to the prophet Isaiah and said to him "Tell the people that I will not forget them. Their names are inscribed on the palms of my hand." As we remember people who are special to us, people we will never forget, it is good to know that we and they are not forgotten by God either.

Advent

The last Sunday in November is Advent Sunday when we begin the four weeks leading up to Christmas. It's a time of expectancy and preparation for the celebration of Jesus' birth. Many people find the weeks before Christmas very busy and stressful trying to get everything done, visitors invited,



presents bought, food thought about etc. Seeing the candles lit, one each week, helps us to pause and live in the moment. The Advent wreath is a decorated ring of four candles and another in the centre which will be be lit at the Christmas services. The candles are different colours, each week reminding us of different aspects of our Christian life.

The first is the Candle of Hope which represents the Patriarchs, Abraham, the Old Testament Ancestors of Jesus. The second is the Candle of Peace. It represents the prophets who foretold the birth of Jesus.

The third is the Candle of love and represents John the Baptist and the fourth is the candle of joy which represents Mary, the mother of Jesus. The central candle is white for the birth of Jesus and is lit on Christmas Day.
