The other day as I was walking in the lanes near my house I saw lots of shiny conkers on the ground. I was delighted that they hadn't already



been gathered up by children and, as I am still a child at heart, I spent the next few minutes picking them up and went home with pockets bulging! There is something beautiful about those small shiny brown seeds. I remember my brothers soaking conkers in vinegar and then baking them in the oven to make them tough enough to win in games of conkers at school. These days health and safety rules have put a stop to conker fights in school (admittedly there were injuries sustained from those contests!) but the World Conker Championships are still held in Northampton every October. Thousands of spectators gather to watch the tournament, with players coming from across the globe!

As I look at my hoard of conkers, now in a bowl but, sadly, losing their shine, they don't seem very useful or beautiful anymore. And yet it might surprise you to know that: a) conkers can help fix sprains and bruises. Apparently the horse chestnut is so named because its seeds were once used to treat ailments in horses.b) conkers can be a moth-repellent. Place fresh conkers in among your clothes and as they dry out they emit a chemical which repels pests. c) conkers contain soap-like chemicals that are sometimes added to shampoos and shower gels.

Their worth goes beyond what is immediately obvious and that is such a valuable reminder for us in a world which judges people so much on power, fame, wealth and ability. Jesus was exactly the opposite. He lifted up the weak, poor and vulnerable. He said, "Whoever humbles himself as a child, he will be great in the kingdom of heaven," (Matt. 18:4) and "Faith is like a mustard seed, the smallest of seeds which becomes the largest of plants" (Matt. 13: 31-32)I pray that you can recognise the value and worth of every part of God's creation and that includes yourself.
